1. Abortion is the intentional act of ending the life of another human being, while in the womb. Lawmakers should work to promote and protect the value of human life from conception to natural death, rather than further expansions of abortion access. (HB126-2026; HB42-2025; HB 148-2024)

RESPONSE Strongly Agree

Life begins at conception. This is a fact, not just a belief. I am a mother and I am a Christian. Life is a miracle and I will always fight to protect the unborn. The unborn deserve protection under the law, which I will consistently fight for and lead in Congress.

2. The danger of chemical abortion has been heavily researched (see EPPC study). Lawmakers should work to ensure that women are fully informed and receive a medical examination prior to receiving such drugs. (HB64-2025; HB117-2026)

RESPONSE Strongly Agree

Chemical abortion is not "safe and easy." Drugs like mifepristone and misoprostol force a woman's body to expel a developing human being - often causing severe cramping, heavy bleeding, and in some cases, incomplete abortion requiring emergency surgery. Women have bled out alone at home. Some have died. Women deserve the truth.

3. Individuals and faith-based entities should have the right of conscience to freely live out their sincerely held convictions without fear of government infringement or retaliation. (HB 207-2025; SF 77-2025)

RESPONSE Strongly Agree

Freedom of conscience is a foundational American right. No individual or faith-based organization should be forced by government to violate their sincerely held beliefs. Wyoming has led the way in protecting this freedom, and I will fight at the federal level to ensure that people of faith are never compelled to choose between their convictions and their livelihoods.

4. Medical personnel should not be required to participate in any medical procedure or service that conflicts with the individual's sincerely held moral, ethical, or religious beliefs. (SF111-2023; HB143-2026)

RESPONSE Strongly Agree

Religious beliefs do not end when one goes to work. Medical professionals choose their careers to heal, not be forced to violate their conscience or beliefs. Simply, this is a violation of individual liberty.

5. Lawmakers should protect minors by ensuring that government-funded spaces, including libraries and public schools, restrict access to sexually explicit content, while recognizing the right of parents to make decisions regarding their minor children's access to such materials. (HB10-2026)

RESPONSE Strongly Agree

Let children be children. Libraries, schools, and other public spaces are not places for content that pushes boundaries of appropriateness. Taxpayer funds are overseen by elected leaders and when funds are spent irresponsibly or not in accordance with the will of the people, lawmakers need to protect children and families. The Fourteenth Amendment give parents authority over their children's education and upbringing. As State Superintendent, upholding parental rights and keeping public spaces appropriate for children were central tenets of my leadership.

6. Wyoming should recognize biological differences between men and women and protect girls' sports, locker rooms, and sex-designated spaces. (SF 44-2025; SF 62-2025; HB 72-2025; HB 32-2025; SF133-2023)

RESPONSE Strongly Agree

Wyoming has rightly acted to preserve the integrity of girls sports and the privacy of girls and women. Recently, the Supreme Court supported states with laws like Wyoming. The Supreme Court did not go far enough. Title IX, a federal law, is clear that this protection should extend to all girls in all states. As Congresswoman, I'll support federal protection for girls, not just state.

7. Lawmakers should support legislation that helps parents stand up to government entities that attempt to circumvent their rights in raising their children. (Sf 09-2024; HB 200-2025)

RESPONSE Strongly Agree

Parents are not obstacles, they are the most important caregivers and teachers in their children's lives. Parents should never be crushed by government or bureaucracy who think government knows best.

8. Lawmakers should allow education funding to follow the child and protect parents' freedom to choose public, public charter, private, or homeschool options. (HB 166-2024; SF 61-2024; HB 199-2025; HB 94-2025; HB 46-2025; HB 23-2026)

RESPONSE Strongly Agree

Public school, especially in Wyoming, is a great choice for most parents, but not all. As State Superintendent, I led work on groundbreaking school choice policy that gives parents more options today. As a mom, I made a faith-based school choice for both of my children and I want every parent to have options.

9. Lawmakers should support open enrollment policies that allow students to attend schools regardless of their geographic address. (SF 109-2025)

RESPONSE Strongly Agree

This is a proven strategy that takes more coordination, but not additional funding. This is a way to make our public schools even better.

10. Lawmakers should ensure that public schools and post-secondary educational institutions do not seek to enforce DEI (Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion) mandates, which promote discrimination by dividing individuals into classes of "oppressed" and "oppressor." (SF 103-2025; HB 147-2025)
