1. Abortion is the intentional act of ending the life of another human being, while in the womb. Lawmakers should work to promote and protect the value of human life from conception to natural death, rather than further expansions of abortion access. (HB126-2026; HB42-2025; HB 148-2024)

RESPONSE Strongly Disagree

I believe every human life has value and deserves legal protection from conception to natural death. As a legislator, I support policies that protect unborn children while also providing compassion and support for mothers, families, and adoption. Wyoming has a responsibility to defend the sanctity of life, and I have supported legislation that reflects those principles. I believe lawmakers should continue advancing policies that protect life rather than expanding abortion access.

2. The danger of chemical abortion has been heavily researched (see EPPC study). Lawmakers should work to ensure that women are fully informed and receive a medical examination prior to receiving such drugs. (HB64-2025; HB117-2026)

RESPONSE Strongly Disagree

Women deserve complete and accurate medical information before making decisions that can have significant physical and emotional consequences. I support commonsense safeguards, including informed consent, appropriate medical evaluation, and physician oversight, to help protect women's health.

3. Individuals and faith-based entities should have the right of conscience to freely live out their sincerely held convictions without fear of government infringement or retaliation. (HB 207-2025; SF 77-2025)

RESPONSE Strongly Disagree

Religious liberty is a fundamental constitutional right that should be protected. Individuals, churches, religious organizations, and faith-based charities should be free to live and operate according to their sincerely held beliefs without government coercion or discrimination. I support policies that protect freedom of conscience while respecting the constitutional rights of all Wyomingites.

4. Medical personnel should not be required to participate in any medical procedure or service that conflicts with the individual's sincerely held moral, ethical, or religious beliefs. (SF111-2023; HB143-2026)

RESPONSE Strongly Disagree

No healthcare professional should be forced to choose between their career and their deeply held moral, ethical, or religious convictions. I support protections that allow medical professionals to decline participation in procedures that violate their beliefs while ensuring patients have access to appropriate information and continuity of care consistent with the law.

5. Lawmakers should protect minors by ensuring that government-funded spaces, including libraries and public schools, restrict access to sexually explicit content, while recognizing the right of parents to make decisions regarding their minor children's access to such materials. (HB10-2026)

RESPONSE Strongly Disagree

Parents have the primary responsibility for raising their children, and government-funded institutions should provide age-appropriate materials for minors. I support reasonable safeguards that restrict minors' access to sexually explicit content in public schools and libraries while preserving parents' ability to make decisions regarding what their own children may access. Protecting children and respecting parental rights are both important responsibilities of state government.

6. Wyoming should recognize biological differences between men and women and protect girls' sports, locker rooms, and sex-designated spaces. (SF 44-2025; SF 62-2025; HB 72-2025; HB 32-2025; SF133-2023)

RESPONSE Strongly Disagree

I believe there are real biological differences between men and women, and Wyoming law should recognize those differences where fairness, privacy, and safety are at stake. I support protecting the integrity of girls' and women's athletics and preserving privacy in sex-designated spaces while treating every individual with dignity and respect.

7. Lawmakers should support legislation that helps parents stand up to government entities that attempt to circumvent their rights in raising their children. (Sf 09-2024; HB 200-2025)

RESPONSE Strongly Disagree

Parents-not the government-have the primary responsibility and authority to raise their children. I support policies that strengthen parental rights, increase transparency, and ensure government agencies and public institutions work in partnership with families rather than circumventing them. Government should respect parents' fundamental role in making decisions about their children's education, healthcare, and overall well-being.

8. Lawmakers should allow education funding to follow the child and protect parents' freedom to choose public, public charter, private, or homeschool options. (HB 166-2024; SF 61-2024; HB 199-2025; HB 94-2025; HB 46-2025; HB 23-2026)

RESPONSE Strongly Disagree

Parents know their children best and should have the freedom to choose the educational environment that best meets their needs. I support expanding educational opportunities, including public schools, charter schools, private schools, and homeschooling. Education funding should prioritize student success while ensuring Wyoming maintains a strong public education system that serves communities across the state.

9. Lawmakers should support open enrollment policies that allow students to attend schools regardless of their geographic address. (SF 109-2025)

RESPONSE Strongly Disagree

Families should have greater flexibility in choosing the public school that best fits their child's educational needs. I support open enrollment policies that expand opportunities for students while recognizing the need for practical implementation that considers school capacity, transportation, and local resources. Giving parents more choices strengthens accountability and improves educational outcomes.

10. Lawmakers should ensure that public schools and post-secondary educational institutions do not seek to enforce DEI (Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion) mandates, which promote discrimination by dividing individuals into classes of "oppressed" and "oppressor." (SF 103-2025; HB 147-2025)

RESPONSE Strongly Disagree

Every student should be treated as an individual and judged by their character, work ethic, and achievements-not by race, sex, or other group identity. I oppose government-mandated DEI policies that require preferential treatment or ideological litmus tests. Our educational institutions should focus on academic excellence, equal opportunity, free inquiry, and preparing students for success.
