*1. Abortion is the intentional act of ending the life of another human being, while in the womb. Lawmakers should work to promote and protect the value of human life from conception to natural death, rather than further expansions of abortion access. (HB126-2026; HB42-2025; HB 148-2024)*

**RESPONSE** Strongly Agree

*2. The danger of chemical abortion has been heavily researched (see EPPC study). Lawmakers should work to ensure that women are fully informed and receive a medical examination prior to receiving such drugs. (HB64-2025; HB117-2026)*

*3. Individuals and faith-based entities should have the right of conscience to freely live out their sincerely held convictions without fear of government infringement or retaliation. (HB 207-2025; SF 77-2025)*

**RESPONSE** Strongly Agree

**4. Medical personnel should not be required to participate in any medical procedure or service that conflicts with the individual's sincerely held moral, ethical, or religious beliefs. (SF111-2023; HB143-2026)**

**RESPONSE Strongly Agree**

Medical professionals should not be compelled to participate in procedures that violate their sincerely held moral, ethical, or religious convictions. Protecting conscience rights preserves personal liberty, professional integrity, and respect for life.

**5. Lawmakers should protect minors by ensuring that government-funded spaces, including libraries and public schools, restrict access to sexually explicit content, while recognizing the right of parents to make decisions regarding their minor children's access to such materials. (HB10-2026)**

**RESPONSE Strongly Agree**

Parents have the primary responsibility to guide and protect their children, and government-funded spaces should uphold standards that preserve the innocence, safety, and dignity of minors. Public institutions should not expose children to sexually explicit material while disregarding the rights of parents.

**6. Wyoming should recognize biological differences between men and women and protect girls' sports, locker rooms, and sex-designated spaces. (SF 44-2025; SF 62-2025; HB 72-2025; HB 32-2025; SF133-2023)**

**RESPONSE Strongly Agree**

Recognizing biological differences between men and women is essential to preserving fairness, safety, and equal opportunity. Protecting sex-specific sports, locker rooms, and spaces ensures that women and girls have equal access to opportunities and privacy protections.

**7. Lawmakers should support legislation that helps parents stand up to government entities that attempt to circumvent their rights in raising their children. (Sf 09-2024; HB 200-2025)**

**RESPONSE Strongly Agree**

Parents, not government bureaucrats or school officials, have the primary right to raise their children. As seen in states like California, policies that sideline parents on major decisions undermine both parental authority and accountability. Lawmakers should ensure government supports families, not replaces them.

**8. Lawmakers should allow education funding to follow the child and protect parents' freedom to choose public, public charter, private, or homeschool options. (HB 166-2024; SF 61-2024; HB 199-2025; HB 94-2025; HB 46-2025; HB 23-2026)**

**RESPONSE Strongly Agree**

Parents are best positioned to understand the educational needs of their children. Funding should follow the student so families have the freedom to choose the educational environment that best supports their child's success, whether public, charter, private, or homeschool.

**9. Lawmakers should support open enrollment policies that allow students to attend schools regardless of their geographic address. (SF 109-2025)**

**RESPONSE Strongly Agree**

Families should have the ability to seek the best educational opportunities available for their children regardless of geographic boundaries. Open enrollment empowers parents, encourages accountability, and allows students to access schools that best meet their academic and personal needs.

**10. Lawmakers should ensure that public schools and post-secondary educational institutions do not seek to enforce DEI (Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion) mandates, which promote discrimination by dividing individuals into classes of “oppressed” and “oppressor.” (SF 103-2025; HB 147-2025)**

**RESPONSE Strongly Agree**

Education should focus on academic excellence, individual achievement, and equal treatment under the law rather than policies that categorize students by identity or promote division. Schools should foster respect and opportunity for every student without advancing frameworks that assign advantage or disadvantage based on characteristics beyond an individual's control.
