1. Abortion is the intentional act of ending the life of another human being, while in the womb. Lawmakers should work to promote and protect the value of human life from conception to natural death, rather than further expansions of abortion access. (HB126-2026; HB42-2025; HB 148-2024)

RESPONSE Strongly Agree

I voted for each of the bills cited in the question and have supported pro-life legislation while in the legislature except when the bill is constructed in a flawed manner that results in unintended consequences.

2. The danger of chemical abortion has been heavily researched (see EPPC study). Lawmakers should work to ensure that women are fully informed and receive a medical examination prior to receiving such drugs. (HB64-2025; HB117-2026)

RESPONSE Agree

I supported HB64 for limiting chemical as the bill came out of the House. The senate made some changes I opposed, but those changes were adopted in the conference committee, I voted against concurrence hoping to see the concurrence committee try to resolve the objections I had. The governor vetoed the bill and I voted to override the veto in support of the bill. I voted for HB117 in this last session, but it was not passed out of committee in the senate.

3. Individuals and faith-based entities should have the right of conscience to freely live out their sincerely held convictions without fear of government infringement or retaliation. (HB 207-2025; SF 77-2025)

RESPONSE Strongly Agree

The protection of religious liberty is one of the most important duties I feel a responsibility for. I for for HB 207 noted above and strongly support the intent of the bill. I also supported SF77, but in my opinion the bill was not a freedom of religion issue.

4

4. Medical personnel should not be required to participate in any medical procedure or service that conflicts with the individual's sincerely held moral, ethical, or religious beliefs. (SF111-2023; HB143-2026)

RESPONSE Agree

SF111 was not heard in the House, I do however agree that child should not be subjected to an operation that would change their sex. They should be allowed to make that choice personally and they reach the age accepted as an adult which is 18. HB143 was not debated on the floor. This bill originated in another state and was addressing a problem that to my knowledge doesn't exist in Wyoming. The penalties were poorly thought out.

5

5. Lawmakers should protect minors by ensuring that government-funded spaces, including libraries and public schools, restrict access to sexually explicit content, while recognizing the right of parents to make decisions regarding their minor children's access to such materials. (HB10-2026)

RESPONSE Strongly Agree

I supported this bill, I thought it was a thoughtful approach to a very emotional problem

6. Wyoming should recognize biological differences between men and women and protect girls' sports, locker rooms, and sex-designated spaces. (SF 44-2025; SF 62-2025; HB 72-2025; HB 32-2025; SF133-2023)

RESPONSE Strongly Agree

I voted for all of the referenced bill and sponsored amendments to improve SF133.

7. Lawmakers should support legislation that helps parents stand up to government entities that attempt to circumvent their rights in raising their children. (SF 09-2024; HB 200-2025)

RESPONSE Strongly Agree

I supported SF09 that reinforced the rights of parent and their access and control of their children while at school, I voted against HB200 as I thought the issues covered in the previous year's bill was sufficient, and this bill was poorly written, which may be the reason it wasn't heard in the senate.

8. Lawmakers should allow education funding to follow the child and protect parents' freedom to choose public, public charter, private, or homeschool options. (HB 166-2024; SF 61-2024; HB 199-2025; HB 94-2025; HB 46-2025; HB 23-2026)

RESPONSE Agree

I voted for all but one of these bills, but my support is cautious. The one I voted against I believe violates the state constitution and is being considered in the courts currently. I worry there is a high risk of abuse of the educational funds.

9. Lawmakers should support open enrollment policies that allow students to attend schools regardless of their geographic address. (SF 109-2025)

RESPONSE Disagree

The biggest problem with open enrollment is the impact on the district physical facilities, means availability of classroom space if there is a large shift in student enrolment on a given year or the excess of space for the same reason. Our system already allows for a student to attend a school outside the district where his family resides, but it give the district some control which I feel is important.

10. Lawmakers should ensure that public schools and post-secondary educational institutions do not seek to enforce DEI (Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion) mandates, which promote discrimination by dividing individuals into classes of “oppressed” and “oppressor.” (SF 103-2025; HB 147-2025)

RESPONSE Strongly Agree

I think local school boards and school administrators have a very clear responsibility to make sure teacher stay of subject matter in the classroom and don't expose students to their personal opinions on social matters.
