Lawmakers should protect minors by ensuring that government-funded spaces, including libraries and public schools, restrict access to sexually explicit content, while recognizing the right of parents to make decisions regarding their minor children's access to such materials. (HB10-2026)*

I was one of the first school board chairman to start a book vetting program. Since then I have testified in several districts to support similar programs to insure that age appropriate materials are being used in all K-12 education facilities. The City, County or state public library will need a little different approach then K-12 education facilities due to the Constitutional obligation to the first amendment. I do think it is appropriate to have or require a process be established to ensure that parents get to help their children make decisions based on their religious, moral or ethical values when it comes minors having access to explicit or graphic materials. We must also remember that some people think that the Holy Bible contains explicit material. A child's family should be responsible for helping them to navigate such choices.
